no hesitation in saying that at the Cambridgehire weights Kildare is the better animal. Both thoroughly ridden out, and Kildare would have had about a length to the goal. For once on Tuesday Kildare will be ridden by a six-stone boy—a very good one, but still a boy—instead of by Cannon. Now in a race like this Cambridgehire how much more would a powerful and artistic jockey like Cannon be able to get out of a horse than a weak boy? Many to whom I have put this problem have replied, "Nearly 10lb." I do not take so much as that, but certainly two or three lengths. I feel, therefore, justified in believing that the despised outsider, Lord Clive, will on Tuesday finish in front of the favourite, Kildare. The best way to put this, that where one is the other is bound to be, and why, therefore, 40 to 1 Lord Clive and 10 to 1 Kildare? With regard to Kildare, the order to the commission is—"Back him for as much as they will lay you to win, provided they at the same time lay you 3 to 1 for a place." Squeaker, in the same stable, judged by the "book," holds Leoville safe, but this year he has not done well, his best performance being in running second for the Learnington Stakes. Of the Fyfield lot it is now almost certain that Out of Bounds will be the best, and yesterday 2 to 1 would have been taken that she starts absolutely first favourite. She will have the advantage of Fordham on her back, and as the form is equal to Phoenix at about 8st. 7lb., she must take a deal of beating. Phoenix, I hear, has become a perfect savage. Lady Beniley, after taking a bold position, has retired, and the best of the Stanton lot we may see is the Cosmowitch outsider, Barley Sugar, who will once more carry Col. Forester's money. A good, useful candidate is Flotsam, who has done as good a preparation as any horse on Newmarket Heath. He has been trained for the most part on ground parallel to the course, and there is not a better mover anywhere. Considering what he did last year, more especially in beating Belphebe, he is wonderfully well in. Lartington, though he carries so much northern money, is not one of my fancies. Kingston was too close up with him at Manchester for him to be the great horse his friends say he is. Nor is the recent run-
